- Crisis Intervention

During the month of December, the Neighborhood Coyote Program continued to document reports and share relevant information to residents who reported coyote activity in their neighborhoods.

Overall, coyote reports were down this month, but that is normal during this time of year.

As a reminder, we also have our new mascot Kyle E. Coyote available for events, and we are happy to provide coyote safety presentations to anyone who is interested.











Within the City of Rosemead, there were 3 reports of coyote interactions for the month of December. Two reports were classified as Response Level 1. Response Level 1 includes the hearing or sighting of coyotes. One report was classified as Response Level 2. Response Level 2 includes coyotes entering a yard with or without pets present. There were 9 coyotes reportedly seen in the City of Rosemead. We reviewed all reports made online via Coyote Cacher, the Neighborhood Coyote reporting form, and by phone.


