MONTH AT Glance

During the month of June, the Neighborhood Coyote Program continued to document reports and share relevant information to residents who reported coyote activity in their neighborhoods. Our coyote social media campaign gained further traction with posts relating to pupping season and coyote myths on Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, and NextDoor. In June, our NextDoor posts had 8,000 impressions and 45 engagements from our 10 cities, all of which were positive. We also participated in a Wildlife Watch meeting with the CA Department of Fish and Wildlife, and are developing new resources for local businesses as the region continues to reopen. We look forward to scheduling an event with the City in the following months!

Within the City of Rosemead, there were 7 reports of coyote interactions for the month of June. Three reports were classified as Response Level 1. Response Level 1 includes hearing or seeing coyotes. Another 3 reports were classified as Response Level 2. Response Level 2 includes coyotes entering a yard with or without pets present. Of the reports made, 1 was classified as Response Level 3. Response Level 3 includes a coyote entering a yard and injuring or killing an attended or unattended pet. There were 11 coyotes reportedly seen in the City of Rosemead.


