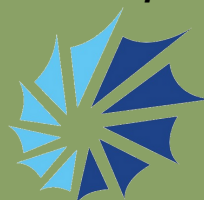

The Neighborhood Coyote Program serves as an avenue to address, educate, and report coyote interactions as well as safety issues caused by coyotes within the San Gabriel Valley. Through education and resourcing, we want to ensure the safety of residents and pets. The Neighborhood Coyote Program provides various methods to report coyote encounters as well as tips and information to promote coyote safety.

MONTH AT GLANCE

During the month of October, the Neighborhood Coyote Program continued to document reports and share relevant information to residents who reported coyote activity in their neighborhoods.

As a reminder, we also have our new mascot Kyle E. Coyote available for events, and we are happy to provide coyote safety presentations to anyone who is interested.



MONTHLY TOTALS AND RESPONSE LEVELS



Within the City of Rosemead, there were 9 reports of coyote interactions for the month of October. Five reports were classified as Response Level 1. Response Level 1 includes hearing or seeing coyotes. Four reports were classified as Response Level 2. Response Level 2 includes coyotes entering a yard with or without pets present. There were 22 coyotes reportedly seen in the City of Rosemead. We reviewed all reports made online via Coyote Cacher, the Neighborhood Coyote reporting form, and by phone.
